The position of Clerk will become available on 1st November 2020



The PARISH CLERK is an important member of the Parish Council team in a non-voting capacity.

Responsibilities include control of finance, preparing the annual budget, payment of invoices, arranging and servicing parish meetings, general correspondence plus liaison with Wiltshire Council and other local bodies.

The Parish Clerk works from home and needs basic IT equipment such as a computer, printer and a broadband connection. A home phone line is required.

Remuneration is for 4 hours per week at national rates depending on experience. (Normally £9-11 per hour).

A contribution towards home expenses will be made by the Parish Council. Authorised travel will be reimbursed.

Experience. The job will suit a competent administrator. Training and support will be available from WALC (Wiltshire Association of Local Councils). WALC will arrange a course for new clerks when Government rules on Covid-19 allow. The Parish Council will pay expenses.



REMEMBRANCE, 8TH NOVEMBER

There will not be a service of Remembrance this year due to Coronavirus restrictions. There will be the usual laying of wreaths at the War Memorial, but you are asked not to attend this year. It is being restricted to just the people who are laying the wreaths. Instead, as the vicar suggests, it would be good if you could stand at your gates or doorsteps to observe the 2 minutes silence. The act of Remembrance is printed in the Newsletter for you to use.

SILVER JUBILEE CUP

The Parish Council have decided to give the pupils of All Saints School the Silver Jubilee Cup this year. They have all been marvellous during the pandemic and should be rewarded.

Richard Marsh, the Chairman of the Governors said:

- Back in April and May, at the height of the pandemic, when grannies and grandads were very ill and, in some cases, passing away, a good number of children came back to school so their parents and carers could go back to work. These were children of key workers, in healthcare, social care, emergency services and teaching.
- The school assembled scores of food parcels for people who were not able to leave their houses, and provided the vouchers for this to be continued through the summer holidays.
- When the school re-opened in June to reception, year 1 and year 6 classes, attendance was very high, despite it not being mandatory.
- Many children carried out sponsored events to raise money for good causes, including the NHS.
- In September, on full opening, 155 of 156 children registered arrived on day 1. Attendance has remained high since, at above 97%, which is a record for All Saints.
- They have adapted brilliantly to the “new rules”. Social distancing in the playgrounds, staggered start and finish times, lunch taken in their classrooms, all pupils facing the front, etc.
- Behaviour and willingness to learn has been top of the class - this gives the best chance of catching up on education missed.

I am at peace, at last!




Another look at family history

When looking into the Barlow family I found that both my parents were very distantly related. It was then that I decided to research the Sheppard Family. When I started I also found as with the Barlow name it was spelt in many different ways; for example Shepherd, Shephard, Sheperd, and Shepard.

I have been able to trace back to my seven times great grandfather, a John Sheppard living in Figheldean , and working as a blacksmith. In 1657 he married Jane Goodall at Figheldean she I believe came from Everleigh. John and Jane went on to have seven children, three girls and four boys. One boy died only one year old another Aeneas died aged twenty years, just a week before his father. When John died he didn't leave a will so Jane his wife took out a Letter of Administration to protect her assets otherwise she could have lost everything. With this Letter was an Inventory of John's assets which came to a value of £22 – 4s – 0d. This amount would equate to about £2540 at this time. Latter William their youngest son set up as a blacksmiths in Figheldean sometime after his father died; unfortunately he had no male heirs.

John and Jane's first son John married at Everley (Everleigh) to a Sarah Sutton in 1683 by Marriage Licence Bond his father was the bondsman, father and son both signed the bond. John and Sarah settled in Netheravon and set up a blacksmiths business there, and it is possible they lived at Lower End, Netheravon. Most Sheppard families lived here until the second half of the 20th century. John and Sarah went on to have seven children of which four survived. It shows what a high mortality there was in young children in these times. An example of this is Mary their daughter who had child named James, and he went on to be married in 1749, and had nine children of which only three reached adulthood. One of these a Mary Sheppard, married, and her descendants spread from Manningford and down the Avon Valley and further afield.

Joseph, from whom I am descended, is John and Sarah's youngest so, married about 1729 to someone named Elizabeth. I have never been able to find their marriage. Without that I don't know what her surname was. They went on to have six children, three boys and three girls. Stephen their youngest child died just aged 23 years. Joseph their eldest son married Jane Stevens and they went on to have five children, but that's another story. The second son Nias Sheppard is my four times great grandfather has this rather unusual Christian name which I think is a variation Aeneas/Ananias. John and Jane Sheppard had a son named Aeneas and that was spelt different ways so this name may have been passed down to Joseph through the family, and I expect the Wiltshire dialect didn't help with the pronunciation of the name. The name of Nias was used by the Sheppard families and also families connected by marriage from the late 1700's on into the 20th century, namely the Farley's and Holmes families. The Farley's used the name in the U.S.A. when they emigrated there in the 1840's. There is a wonderful memorial stone in Winterbourne Monkton Church Yard near Avebury of a Nias Farley. He is descended from Nias Sheppard's daughter Jane who married James Farley in 1788.

I'll do more about Nias Sheppard's family at a later date.
